# The Town Hall SQUARE

Entering the Old Town leads you to the Town Hall Square. The former market hub is now lined with restaurants, cafes, and shops. The 13th-century Tallinn Town Hall is **the oldest in Northern Europe**,



Tallinn Town Hall Pharmacy, Europe's oldest continuously operating pharmacy, dates back to 1422. The Burchart family ran it for ten generations. Today, the pharmacy includes a museum showcasing its history and medieval healing methods, with guided tours and workshops available.





# KADRIORG

## *Park & art museum*

Kadriorg, one of Tallinn's most upscale districts, is home to Estonia's only Baroque palace, built 300 years ago by Tsar Peter the Great. Now a cultural center with museums and historic villas, it's a beautiful spot for a leisurely stroll or bike ride through its charming streets.

# *National art museum* **KuMu**

Kumu, the main building of the Art Museum of Estonia, showcases Estonian art from the 18th century to today. Opened in 2006, Kumu sparks social and cultural debate with its art history exhibits and contemporary gallery. Its permanent exhibition highlights Estonian art, while temporary shows feature international and modern works. Check the Kumu calendar for events and exhibitions.





Noblessner, a former submarine shipyard in Northern Tallinn, is now a vibrant marine area with art galleries, shops, sea-view restaurants, and a visitor marina.



Recognized as the best redevelopment in the Baltics, this car-free zone offers a stylish urban experience next to the Seaplane Harbour.

# Seaplane HARBOUR

The Seaplane Harbour, one of Europe's most exciting maritime museums, showcases around 200 authentic items, including the submarine Lembit, icebreaker Suur Tõll, and seaplane Short 184.

Visitors can enjoy interactive experiences like simulators, an aquarium, and a children's corner, plus café MARU and a museum shop.



## The Conference Dinner

Telliskivi is located within walking distance of the Old Town – follow the direction of the railway tracks past the Balti Jaam market. You can also take the tram (1 or 2, stop Telliskivi) from the city centre.

Telliskivi Creative City is a collection of former factory and railway buildings transformed into a centre for creative enterprises: an entire quarter filled with offbeat eateries, trendy cafés, and hip bars along with design, antique and vintage shops.

The Creative City is also home to many regular outdoor and community events, such as the Telliskivi Flea Market.



# PIECE OF BANKSY

Banksy, a renowned yet mysterious artist from Bristol, is known for pushing boundaries with his graffiti and paintings. "The Mystery of Banksy - A Genius Mind" showcases over 200 of his famous works, highlighting his mastery and art as a tool for influence.

# MAARJAMÄE

## *Victims of Communism Memorial*

The memorial honors the Estonian victims of Soviet terror, with over 75,000 people imprisoned, deported, or killed. It includes Teekond (Journey), featuring 22,000 plaques with victims' names, and Koduaed (Home Garden), symbolizing dreams and homesickness with apple trees and bees.

The complex serves as a reminder of the fragility of freedom and life.





# The Song Festival

The Tallinn Song Festival Grounds, famous for the Estonian Song Festival and major concerts, can host 15,000 singers and 100,000 viewers.
